



Why bookshops?

At Kett's Books, we know that the right book can change your life.

It's a rare and wonderful thing - not every book will be able to do this. But you've got a much better chance of discovering exactly the right book you need right now, if you look in the right places.

Independent bookshops are a good place to start. They only sell the books they choose, and they match them to their community and what they like to read.

At Kett's Books we've taken that practice of independence, and grown it. Our space is little, but our impact is big: twenty-five volunteers work regular shifts, and another twenty or so work behind the scenes, to understand which books our readers deeply need, and what will make them happy.

Because we're readers ourselves, we know that sometimes you're not just looking for any old book – there are times you need a book that will show the way, restore your faith in humanity, or support you to step up to being the person you know you are meant to be. Our community saved the shop from closing, so we can be there to help find that book for you.

Life throws things at you - so you need an independent bookshop to help you find the right book. And you know, a life-changing gift isn't just going to fall into your trolley in the supermarket. Nor is it likely to get spewed out as the product of a robot algorithm online.

If your book matters, it should be put in your hand by someone who's looked you in the eye and noticed you're there.

It's not just bookshops where this applies, of course. Supporting independent and local shops supports the human connection, builds local economies, and preserves dying trades. It's a neighbourly thing to do.

We've stepped up to run the bookshop the way we think people should shop. By being independent, and by asking fair trade prices, Kett's Books is able to support writers and publishers. This is good for readers and everyone who loves language and believes in its power to change. The best books keep being written, and we're able to bring them to you.

History of 'the bookshop in Wymondham'


Our oldest customers tell us that Wymondham has 'always' had a bookshop. We can't trace it back as far as that, but we know that our own story started very late in 2013, when the town was about to lose its bookshop to retirement. But Ray Rumsby, a loyal customer of the bookshop as it was then, was determined that Wymondham is the kind of town that needs an independent bookshop – and the rest is our history.

Ray took action. He called a public meeting in the Cross Keys pub, and in September 2013 a bunch of strangers agreed that we could face this challenge and save the shop. We asked each other, 'How difficult can it be?'

We've now spent five years answering that question, and despite challenges, we've pulled through. Even back then in the pub, having just met, we knew we were onto something: we shared a vision of a place where people of all ages can come together to talk about books and spread the love of reading with our town.

We moved quickly: only sixteen weeks later, on 1 February, we had funding, had done all the legal bits, got our teams organised, and opened Kett's Books. It's a story we tell again and again – in every window our volunteers Nicki and Mary put



Author events

Being a bookshop means our community of volunteers and customers always have something to talk about – What are you reading? is our favourite question!

So when we get the opportunity to invite one of our most popular authors to come visit us, we are all eager to hear more, first-hand.

And though it's a great thrill meeting our favourite writer face-to-face, we believe that being in a room with an author and hearing them discuss their work is more important than that. Hearing about the motivation for a piece of writing, and having the opportunity to ask questions, makes the reading experience more personal.

Readers who meet authors think more about the thinking behind the book, and become better thinkers themselves. Our community becomes more empathetic, creative and curious. And we all discover new favourite books to discuss, together. It's what community bookshops are about.

Outreach

Being a not-for-profit means that we are motivated by more than money – so we try to make everything we do matter, even if it's just offering a customer a drink.

But we don't just wait for them to come to us. Because we have so many willing volunteers, we can leave our comfortable courtyard and go to where the people are - so they know about Kett's Books, and so they can benefit from our work, too.

Here are a few examples of what we've done this year to take the bookshop beyond its walls:

- Every year we visit dozens of schools to hold assemblies, book fairs, and read with children.
- We have worked with Wymondham High Academy to create a list of competencies so our youngest volunteers can build a portfolio of transferrable skills.



In October 2018 we asked Norfolk-based children's author Isabelle King to hold a children's writing workshop for us in the library. The children were fascinated by her stories of local history, and threw themselves into the task of creating their own fantastical characters within our historical county.



At our school book fairs we allow pupils to help run the book event, and we also lead assemblies to help deliver the message about building excitement around choosing the right book.

 We went into Wymondham High to launch a project teaching pupils marketing skills for a real business setting.

 We happily and freely give prizes to schools and charities for use in their fundraising.

Each month we run two book groups for adults, a book group for ages 9-11, and a story tea party. We are always interested in developing further groups, so do speak with us if you're interested in setting one up.

In World Book Week 2018 we visited twelve schools in 10 days, shifting up to 400 books per visit, and giving away balloons and hundreds of World Book Day books which we purchased for the occasion. We do this to reach the children who would not be brought to the bookshop, to build excitement around reading.


Our TOP 10 bestsellers this year

Friends

The door at Kett's Books is always open to the whole community, not just our volunteers. Many of our regular customers have joined our Friends scheme, which our volunteer David Kinnaird has been leading since 2014. With the help of dedicated shop colleagues, the Friends group has grown to a large group of 210 committed, card-carrying supporters of the shop.

David and all of us at Kett's Books are really grateful to all our Friends for their ongoing support. The annual subscription means that the bookshop has been able to meet the sometimes unexpected costs that a business can face, and allows us the cash flow to take opportunities we might otherwise miss out on.

We hope we are friendly with all our customers! However the Friends scheme is for those supporters who want to do that bit more, without the commitment of volunteering. For £20 a year Friends get 10% off purchases, previews and extra discounts on not-yet-published pre-orders, and free tickets to many events.

Our customers love to show their Friends card – it's like a secret pass to show that they are in on what's special about Kett's Books, and that they are one of those who make it happen.









Finance

Outreach: One Community, One Book


One Community

In March 2019, at the end of this financial year, we launched our biggest outreach project yet. Reflecting on the contribution our colleague Geoff had made to our community, we wanted to create a project in the spirit of the conversation and friendship we enjoyed with him.

We decided to create a book group for the whole town, where we all read the same book, for a year. Finding a book which we could endorse and give to anyone would be a challenge, but we decided to take the leap, and soon discovered *We Must Be Brave* and its wonderful author Frances Liardet. We used the initial seed money that Geoff's family gave us to invite Frances to visit Wymondham four times during the year, for a variety of community events.

The book is perfect for pulling people together of all ages, as it's about a 20th century life, a small town pulling together in the face of terrible hardship, and the lifelong pain of separation.

Wymondham has enthusiastically joined with us to support the project, and we are thrilled to see groups across town joining the discussion. It's a new effort and we don't know what will happen next – what we do know is that it is already exceeding our hope that it would create conversations and introduce friendships where they didn't exist before.
